Fire in Indiana—Heavy Loss. (By telegraph to the Asheville Citizen.) EVANSVILLE, Aug. 3.—A fire this morning destroyed the lumber yard of the Armstrong Company with some 2,000,000 feet of lumber. The Armstrong's saw mill, stables and two dwellings, and lumber yard of John A. Reitzel & Son with some 5,000,000 feet of lumber, 15 cars of rail Peora Deatur and Evansville Railroad, and a large warehouse containing tobacco, grain, and general merchandise were consumed. Total loss \$2,300,000, insurance \$100,000.
