"Plain Jane" and striped squares are the most fundamental part of what Knit-A-Square does. It takes 35 of these squares to make a blanket for a child in need, and each square is treasured (even if they sometimes come out a bit wonky!)

Materials and Equipment

- Worsted yarn (U.S.)/Double Knit (UK)/8 ply (Aus), 100gm (3.5oz) in any combination of colours.
- One pair 6mm needles (size 10 US, size 4 Old UK).
- A yarn sewing needle

Instructions

Cast on 35/36 stitches. (Try to make your stitches neither too loose nor too tight to help ensure uniform squares. This may vary slightly depending on your tension.)

Row 1: Knit.

Row 2: Knit.

Rows 1 and 2 form the 'garter' stitch knitting pattern for your square. Continue knitting as per these two rows until your square is as long as it is wide.

To ensure your square is 20cm/8" either use a tape measure or form a triangle by folding one corner of your square over to meet the opposite corner as shown - if all sides are equal - then you have a square!



Cast off / bind off. Leave a 50 cm/20" tail (for sewing the squares together).
Butterfly* the tail to the square.

**How to 'butterfly the tail' is as easy as 1, 2, 3 . Use contrasting yarn and follow the directions:*



Sew/darn in any other yarn ends along the edge of the square.

Variations

To create stripes in the square, wait until the end of a row, then change to a different coloured yarn. You can do this as often as you like. Experiment with different colours to get interesting new looks. (Always weave in loose ends)
