Rector's Reflections



Dear Friends,

I wonder, would you say Pen Selwood had much evidence of large amounts of flowing water? The visitor would probably so “no” (except for the stream at Pen Mill). However, from what I hear, residents and regular walkers would say otherwise. The type of soil conditions mean that the water is held longer than in many areas.

I am raising this subject because water often comes to my mind since I returned from my study leave. One of the themes I followed in times of prayer, reflection and poetry is that of flowing water and how it helped my thinking about time – past, present and future. Time flows under the bridge, and I wanted to learn how to manage (let go?) of my past ... memories, regrets, joys etc, as well as deal with my thoughts of the future by clearing away unnecessary worry, or even fear. This leaves that vital notion of learning to live in the present moment.

Interestingly, as I write, there is a series of spoken essays at lunchtimes on Radio 4 on the theme of rivers... how they evoke feelings and imagery of romance, of adventure, of history, of philosophy and the very significant use of river imagery in various religions. Rain, rivers and seas can also show the cycle of life. In addition, Scripture refers to the river of life in the stories of our origin and of our ending; and at funerals I often refer to God as the fount of life, and the fount of Love.

I think many of us find watching water flowing in its natural environment both fascinating and thought provoking....from the skipping determination of a cascading stream to the vast and timeless movement of the sea stretched out to the horizon. These are aids to reflection and also to prayer. As the water travels, so can we 'travel' in our spiritual journey.

I end, with a verse from a favourite hymn - the Boys' Brigade Vesper ..

*We thank Thee for the day that's done,
We trust Thee for the days to be,
Thy Love we learn in Christ Thy Son,
O may we all Thy glory see!*

Olive Emily Moldram

The Moldram family, originally from Germany, settled in Pen Selwood over four hundred years ago. They set up a stocking factory in a field in Marsh Lane in an area which is now a nature reserve known as Moldram's Ground.

Olive, one of eleven children, was born on 4 October 1927. She attended the village school (now the village hall) from the age of seven where she enjoyed learning and was an avid reader.

At the age of 14, Olive went into service at The Grange at Chaffey Moor. She stayed there for nine years. In 1942, she went to work in the Cow and Gate milk factory where she soon became forewoman, looking after around ninety women. When the factory closed its doors, she was made redundant. But her reputation for hard work and loyalty was well-known and she undertook cleaning duties for many in the village. These employers and their children became her close friends.

Olive had many hobbies including cooking, knitting, reading and gardening. She was very proud of her cottage garden which has long been admired by all who passed by. Over the years she also had many entries and winners with her flowers into the annual fete's flower show.

She was an avid Manchester United football supporter and always had an opinion on the individual players and managers. She also went to watch Yeovil Town Football club play. In her younger days belonged to the ladies village football team herself.

It is widely known that Olive was a very keen cook. She produced countless cakes, scones, pastries, puddings and meals for family members and friends to enjoy, to compete in the food section of the produce show, and for fete teas and other village events.

In 2013, Olive was awarded a Poppy Appeal Service Award for 35 years' dedicated service to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.

A great part of Olive's life was her faith. She was baptised and confirmed in the village church. She rang the bells, became a church warden, served on the parish church committee and devoted her life to the church. She also sang in the choir and was famous for her clear singing voice.

She never married, but Olive treated all of her many, many nephews and nieces as her very own and she never ceased being interested in and caring about all of her family.

Olive died on 21 July 2016. It is almost impossible to imagine her family and the village of Pen Selwood without her at the centre of them, but we know that her memory will live on forever more in all who knew and loved her.

Garden notes for Pen

So what do we make of our summer in the garden? It seems almost on a par with the crazy political situation, and probably just as inaccessible to do anything about. The yo-yo like effect of the weather has had odd effects, and I have to say that after 60 years of gardening I have never seen such odd things being affected. Eating courgette with asparagus? Raspberries and strawberries from the garden on the same plate (and even red and black currants and blueberries too). It makes for busy days for the fruit gardener. Vegetables have also been affected. One makes excuses – the early dry and cold period, the wet and miserable days. We wonder where our summer went, and so must the plants, trying to grow with these odd changes to our weather.

The ornamental garden has been lovely, despite the tendency to grow into a jungle. But what a wonderful colourful jungle with so many flowers doing well, even if the timing might be a little odd.

So what can one suggest in a world where climate does seem to be changing.

It must be more important not to keep all our eggs in one basket. Try different kinds of vegetables and fruit, possible with differently timed sowings and plantings. The shrubs may need some cutting back, and steer away from the less hardy varieties, not only bedding plants damaged by late frosts, but slightly more delicate shrubs and perennials may get caught by cold periods which take us as well as the plants by surprise. Even grass has been a bit unpredictable with alternating periods of little or more vigorous growth. We might get even more surprises with a long and hot Autumn, but beware the cold nights that have had a big effect this year.

Whatever, despite all the cutting back and tidying will be needed, and the seemingly perpetual leaf raking (hopefully for rotting down to make leaf mould), it is a lovely time to look at the garden, anticipate a rest from the work, but plan for 2017. Dare I suggest having an allotment to provide your kitchen. Worth considering, and good for the waistline.

Parish Council Chairman's report

Two things stand out in the work of the Parish Council these last couple of months.

The first concerns the news that BT will not be bringing faster broadband to Pen at the moment. Both Jane and Alex have been working to get confirmation of BT's intentions and have been looking at alternatives to fibre. Their reports appear on the next page. The Parish Council will continue to pursue ways to upgrade our broadband speeds. It is very important that villages like ours are not left behind and disadvantaged technologically.

The second thing is the landslip at Coombe Street at the end of June. Tony has been in consultation with Highways and they have confirmed that they are responsible for the repairs. We are still waiting for a date for this, though it now looks as if it will not be done before autumn as we had originally hoped. It will necessitate the closure of part of Coombe Street whilst the works are being carried out.

One last piece of news - from next year our black bins will be collected every third week instead of fortnightly but we will be able to recycle more plastics. Hopefully this means more tubs and packaging that will no longer be going to landfill.

If you have anything you wish to discuss with the Parish Council please come to one of our meetings or talk to any one of us at any time.

Our next meeting is in the Village Hall on the 14th September at 7.30pm.

Broadband

No Fibre-optic broadband from BT

An open meeting held in the village hall in Feb 2015 was attended by a representative of BT and of the “Connecting Devon & Somerset Partnership” (CD&SP) who are tasked with the rolling out of rural broadband locally. They explained that Penselwood was due to be evaluated for the viability of getting a fibre connection to the village between January and June 2016. By July this year there was still no update on the website regarding this evaluation. I contacted the Somerset County Council rep who attended the meeting to find out what was happening. The answer eventually was that the evaluation had taken place and that Penselwood would **NOT** be receiving a fibre upgrade to our cabinet under phase 1 of the broadband roll out scheme.

I have tried to establish the basis of that decision but have so far been unsuccessful. I am particularly concerned that the decision not to proceed has been made when the cabinet serving Pen (located by Long Lane Stables) is only a mile from its feeder cabinet in Bourton which is fibre enabled.

Alex Juckes is looking at options and has a proposal below.

Wessex Internet – please register your interest now!

There are a number of alternative providers in the market place that we can look at, one, Wessex Internet is already very close to us, supplying properties in Cucklington, Charlton Musgrove and Gasper. In addition to fibre optic, they also use microwave technology, which helps them to reach outlying properties more easily. They have a range of packages for both domestic and business users which are comparable to BT’s own pricing structure and can also provide telephone calls (VOIP telephony) at good rates. We are keen to talk to them to find out what they can do for the village and how much it would cost.

If you are interested in progressing this, I would urge you to please log onto www.wessexinternet.com and 'Register your interest' with them as soon as possible. They need at least 30 households to do this in order to demonstrate sufficient level of interest for them to undertake a feasibility survey. Please note, this does not commit you to anything at this stage. The sooner Wessex Internet do this, the sooner they can talk to us about what is and isn't possible and what the likely cost implications are.

In the meantime, it is important not to become tied into a lengthy contract with your current provider and in fact this is one of the questions on the Wessex Internet form, so it is worth checking where you stand on this.

I would be most grateful if when you have registered your interest, you could please let me know, so we can keep tabs on progress and follow up with Wessex Internet promptly. Follow the Village Website at www.penselwood.ning.com/page/broadband for regular updates and information.

Farming Diary

Silage and haymaking are finished. After a cold, late spring with grass not really growing until mid-May, nature managed to even it out and by mid-July we had some heavy cuts of grass, and made some good hay in that hot week. However our last two fields received more rain than was forecast and some bales are heating up and sweating in the barn. They'll be alright for cattle to eat as they are more tolerant than sheep or horses.

In late July Ballands Bowmen held a two day Archery competition in the Coombe. The club was started by my father-in-law, Major Archer over 40 years ago. 70-80 people came from all over the country, including the Isle of Man, to take part under the eyes of three judges. With many different categories and classes of bow most went away with a medal and all went home happy.

For 10 years we have taken part in the Government's Environmental Enhancement Schemes (E.L.S. and H.L.S.), which for us came to an end in April. It has been replaced by the Countryside Stewardship scheme which is much more difficult to enter and requires record keeping in minute detail along with hundreds of photos around the farm. This has put off many potential candidates and attracted only 25% of those who took part in the earlier schemes. At the end of a long day the last thing I want to do is spend an hour or two writing about it!

A scheme I do belong to is the Dorset Coppice Group which has been going for 12 years. It is a loose group of craftsmen who work in wood. they join for mutual support and for joint marketing of their varied products. They have adopted Bonsley Wood at Durweston near Branford and by good management and regular cutting of the hazel they are restoring it from its former neglected state. I joined as a horse-logger with my shire horse, Major, and moved the timber to be sawn, which was then built into a substantial hut which was opened by the Princess Royal. We have social events and learn from each other for example how to make rush seats for chairs.

Look on the website for details of The Dorset Coppice Groups 'Living Classroom' and Open Days at Bonsley Wood to view craftsman at work. The next date is 22 October.


