



Loom Comfort Doll

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The **advanced beginner** will enjoy making this delightful doll. It is approximately 8 inches/20 cm in height, just the right size for a child to cuddle.

A child in South Africa would love to have a toy of their very own. This doll will become a special friend to be hugged and provide opportunities for creative play and imaginative conversation.

Materials and Equipment:

Stitches: [Knit Stitch](#) (Flat)

Loom: Small 24-Peg Loom

Yarn: Any Yarn (about 90 Yards), Embroidery Floss for Eyes and Mouth

Notions: Loom Hook, Yarn Needle, Large Sewing Needle

Notes:

- If using a large gauge loom, knit with [two strands of yarn held together](#) as one throughout the pattern.
- The pattern starts from the bottom (feet) – up (hat)

Instructions:

Cast-on: [e-Wrap](#)

Feet – Shoe or Skin Tone

5 Rows of Flat Knit Stitch

Pants– Change color

14 Rows of Flat Stitch

Shirt – Change color

12 Rows of Flat Stitch

Face – Change color

10 Rows of Flat Stitch

Hat – Change color

11 Rows of Flat Stitch

Bind-off: Basic

Finishing Touches

To create the **Feet** – Close the bottom opening flat. Next feed a matching thread through the middle to split and form two legs.

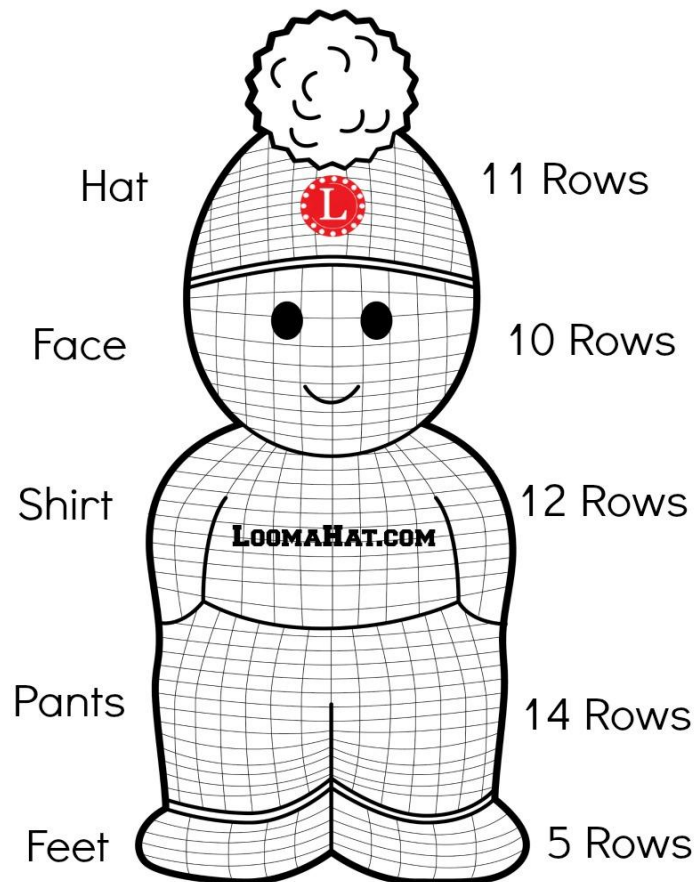
As you work your way up, stuff the doll with poly-fil or left over matching yarn.

To create the **Arms** - From the pants waistline up to the top of the shirt, feed thread that matches the shirt on both sides.

To create the **Neck** – Wrap a thread around the top of the shirt between the purled line and the face. Pull the thread tight, tie, cut extra thread, push knot into the knitting.

To create the **Face** – Use yarn or embroidery thread to add the facial features.

To make a [Pom-Pom](#) – Use your yarn needle to attach it to the top of the hat.



Variations:

Create a girl doll with just a few changes to the Finishing Touches.
