Preparation:

Copy and cut up the sheet so that you can give each student one set of 3 *Find someone who...* instructions.

In class:

Give each student one set of 3 *Find someone who...* instructions.

Ask them to read them and check for understanding. Students mingle about and find the 3 people on their paper. They should ask as many people as possible as quickly as possible. This can be made into a competition with a prize for the first one to finish, or it can simply be allowed to go for a certain length of time.

This activity can be used to practise and revise many different structures. Once they are familiar with the idea, students can think up their own *Find someone who ...* instructions (individually or in pairs) for other students.

Selected Answers:

Thank you in Turkish is *teşekkür ederim*

Hello in Spanish is *hola* or *buenos días*
