

the joy of reading award

Illiteracy is a global problem. The Systematic – Joy of Reading Award, worth \$10,000, is awarded to projects that promote the joy of reading and fight illiteracy. Mignon Hardie, Executive Director and Trustee, representing the organisation FunDza Literacy Truste, South Africa received Tuesday afternoon the Joy of Reading Award 2017. Four particular considerations were crucial as a backdrop for selecting FunDza Literacy Trust as the first winner of the Joy of Reading Award: The project is long term (it has been running since 2011) and highly

effective. By 2016, the project had reached out to about 600,000 children. The project clearly stated outcomes involving reading for pleasure, making sure there is a difference from school material. The project particularly targets formats suitable for smartphones and other mobile devices, providing an online library service wherever Internet access is available. A social media presence is also emphasised. The project ensures that young people have material they would want to read. Many of the writers are young South Africans who the readers can

relate to. The project offers editorial support to emerging authors, and new local stories that are very relevant to everyday life and challenges are added each week. These stories feature a variety of themes, and are usually set in townships. Furthermore, evaluations and online data are collected to find out what readers enjoy and how to improve what's on offer.

The award was presented at the Next Library Festival in Dokk1 by HRH Princess Laurentien of the Netherlands.

meet the winners

EIFL and Next Library are delighted to present the winners of seven scholarships to attend Next Library Festival. Each of the seven winners will participate in the festival by helping to shape the programme, and share experiences and ideas. They will also inform their colleagues and communities about the festival through social media, presentations and other channels. We asked them what they would bring to the table at Next Library and what they expect to take back from the conference to use in their future work. Every day of the Festival you will meet some of them here in the Next Library Daily.

Bright Ofori, Assistant Librarian at Volta Regional Library, Ho, the administrative Capital of the Volta Region, Ghana

My experience and success at handling the mobile library ICT classes for basic schools in Ho Municipality of Ghana gave me the understanding of how much libraries can contribute



towards development through extension activities. Grades of pupils were improved over the period as well as increase in enrolment of schools. Further, the Volta Regional Library has become more visible in the region as a result of community engagement in collaboration with school management. The experience of prioritizing programs that are sustainable with little resources available taking into consideration stakeholder satisfaction is what I bring to the conference.

Researching into innovative ideas will be one area I will be focusing on. Another is developing new services into programs and its sustainability. Starting a new service that is problem solving and not been able to sustain it is as good as not starting it at all. My focus here will be on how other participants are able to develop new services and most importantly, sustain these services in their library work. Finally, the exposure will enable me build new ties across the globe for professional purposes.

Charles Kamdem Poeghela, Director of the Centre for Reading and Cultural Activities (CLAC) in Yaounde, Capital of Cameroon



I'm a librarian. I have been working at CLAC since 2007. CLAC was awarded the EIFL Innovation Award in 2016. At Next Library 2017, I will share the experience of CLAC in preparing and implementing activities in this type of library. I will share two successful experiments by CLAC: the project *Khan Academy* and the project *Street CLAC*, the first mobile library in Cameroon.

I would like to discover the libraries of Denmark. I would like to understand the functioning of libraries in Northern Europe. I want to discover innovative activities in libraries where colleagues from other countries work. Exchange on the establishment of FabLab, Coworking Spaces, incubator of startups within the library. Finally, I would like to have partnerships with libraries and associations.
